11. an average of 15.6 percent of our senate is absent at each meeting-three percent more than during the 1951-52

2. for the first nine meetrings this year (when no freshwan representatives were apresent) there were approxivenately twice as many absentees as for the first nine *meetings of last year.

3. several of our senators have particularly bad records -two having missed five meetings, one having missed wour and three having missed three.

This is not a particularly encouraging commentary on those who participate in this thing called student government, especially when one realizes that all we're asking of them is two or three hours once every week or so. Sadder still is the fact that on at least two occasions this year, the most recent being last Tuesday's meeting, the senate couldn't even hold on to a quorum long enough to finish business.


