# Jim Livesay, Oregon Outfielder, Awarded Emerald Sports Trophy

Jim Livesay, Oregon outfielder, was presented Saturday night with the Emerald Athletic Award, given annually to the senior athlete who has shown the most athletic ability, scholarship and campus citizenship.

Livesay, one of the baseball team's co-captains, is the first baseball player to receive the honor since it was started two years ago. Previously it has been presented to Jack Keller, basketball guard, and Jack Hutchins, track star.

**Committee of Eight**  
A committee of eight students, faculty members and local citizens picked the outstanding athlete from a list of seven seniors who had not been eliminated from the original thirty.

The trophy, sponsored jointly by the Daily Emerald and the athletic department, bears the inscription "awarded annually to a University of Oregon student on the basis of outstanding achievement in the fields of athletics, scholarship and citizenship."

Leo Harris, director of athletics at the university, made the presentation of the trophy, and awarded Livesay with a small "O" lapel button.

**Four Year Baseball Man**  
Livesay first played for Oregon baseball team as a catcher, his sophomore year he was moved to an outfield post where he hit at a steady .362 percentage. Next year, 1952, he followed with a .333.

At the beginning of this season, he returned to his spot behind the plate for a few games, but has since moved back to his regular position in center field.

Livesay is currently leading the Webfoot batters, who are tied for first in the Northern Division with the OSC Beavers.

Oregon's travel weary baseball nine ended a ten day road trip last Friday by dropping the University of Washington twice in a doubleheader 3-0 in a ten inning opener and 4-0 in the nightcap.

Norm Forbes outlasted Husky hurler Bill Reams in the first contest, as the Ducks capitalized on three walks and two singles for two runs in the first extra inning. The win was Forbes' third against two losses in the Northern Division play.

Oregon made a clean sweep of the doubleheader as Stan Dmoshowsky threw his second three

hitter of the season. He collected his third conference win. The Webfoots collected seven hits, including a two run double by Earl Averill in the sixth frame.

The Oregon nine ran their conference record to 8 wins and 3 losses in the Seattle series. By virtue of won-lost records the Ducks hold the Division lead over Oregon State by one half a game, but the Beavers lead the league percentage-wise, with a 6 and 2 record.

# Cougars Capture Dual Meet Title

Washington State Cougars finished their Northern Division dual meet season undefeated and captured the dual meet crown by beating the strong Washington Huskies 79 1/2-51 1/2 at Seattle, Saturday. The perennial champions from the Palouse hills captured 10 of the 15 events and swept the javelin as they completely dominated the field events.

Denny Meyer ran the second best two mile in the nation this year in downing WSC's Al Fisher. Although the Huskies' Fred Guenther took both the high and low hurdles, the WSC depth smashed Washington's hopes of a cham-

ampionship. Washington had been undefeated in conference competition until Saturday.

Meanwhile, at Moscow, OSC beat the Idaho Vandals 74 to 57. Merv Brock proved that he was still one of the top sprinters in the northwest as he won the 100 yard dash in :9.7 and then came back to take the 220 with a time of :23.9. A strong, chilly wind kept most of the times down. The only new record of the day came when Ralph Sutton tossed the javelin 207 feet 6 inches to break the record of 201 feet 8 inches which he set last year.

Southern Division competition was suspended while all of the

California schools participated in the Fresno relays. Parry O'Brien of Southern Cal turned in the best performance of the relays as he finally broke the world's shot put record with a toss of 59 feet 3/4 inches. The old record, held by Jim Fuechs of Yale, was 58 feet, 10 1/2 inches.

Oregon's Webfoots took last weekend off and prepared for next Saturday's big meet with the OSC Beavers at Eugene which will end the 1953 dual meet season. The Ducks will be gunning for their ninth victory in the last eleven meetings with the Beavers and will be heavily favored to beat the impatient Aggies.

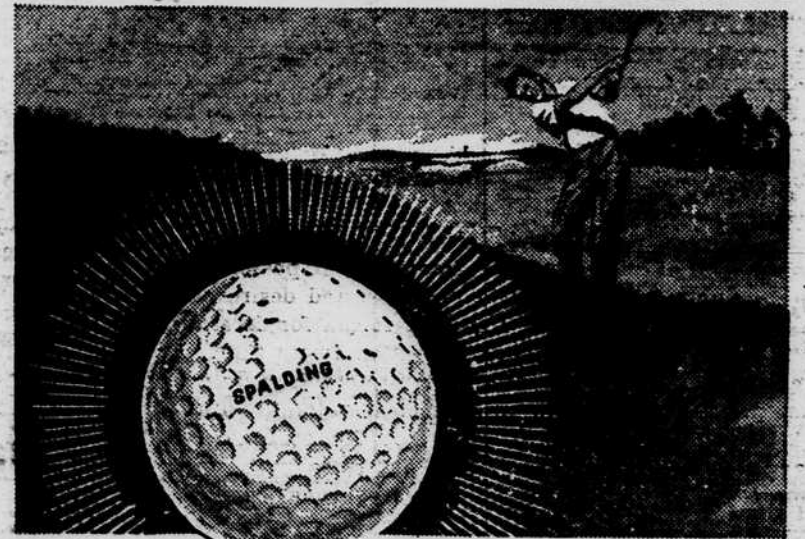
