



Still a Mystery

There have been no new developments on the latest blasting of the "O" on Skinner's Butte since Friday, when the police found a bundle of 21 dynamite sticks which had failed to explode after two earlier blasts went off.

The recently-repaired "O" was given an orange painting before being blasted into the shape of an inverted "U." As they did last year, the police set up road blocks shortly after the Friday earlymorning blast, but the vandals escaped undetected.

The county explosives expert sent to make the unexploded charge safe voiced the opinion that the destroyers of the "O" certainly weren't powder experts." He said the 21 sticks didn't fire because the cap was crimped too tightly around the fuse.

There were actually two blasts. about a minute apart. A patrol car was already on its way up Skinner's Butte when the second explosion went off.

The third charge of 21 dynamite sticks failed to go off. Police found a pile of dynamite, attached to a fuse and a cap, under a shattered slab of concrete.
