Transfers to Board Twenty-four women transfer students are being housed in three sororities on campus, Alpha Xi Delta, Sigma Kappa and Zeta Tau Alpha. This is the first time sororities have accepted boarders since Carson hall was completed, said Mrs. Wickham.
