The old building was completed in 1900 to house the chemistry department and was dedicated by the class of 1901 to Edgar Mc-Clure, a young chemistry professor who was killed in a fall on Mt. Rainier three years earlier.

In 1922 a new journalism building was constructed on the east end of McClure. Confusion reigned during the years when the journalism school set up a print shop in the basement of McClure, and the chemistry offices spread to the first floor of journalism.

The chemistry department deserted both buildings in 1952 to move into the new science building. Journalism took over, but Mc-Clure was doomed with the authorization of funds for the construction of the new journalism building.
