From the Bitter Student

Emerald Editor: I doubt if your paper will print this. That makes no difference. I've got to write this letter anyway.

Several days ago, I attended a college discussion here on fraternity life. The chief speaker, an anonymous student, high in Oregon fraternity and student political life, was attempting to describe to us the details and atmosphere of fraternity life.

Nearing the end of his discussion, this anonymous "person" (I can't call him a man) chose to talk on fraternity selection, and the "racial exclusion" clause. I quote from memory: "Some of you I know," he said "are curious about the fraternity 'exclusion' policy. We realize it's a ticklish subject, but basically, we feel like this. No fraternity on campus pledges a Chinese. Three fraternities have Hawaiian members. None will pledge a Negro. We don't pay much attention to all this and would rather just overlook the whole thing."

Why am I writing this letter now? Frankly, it is the only way I can save my self-respect. Listening to this "person," I should have stood on my own two feet and kicked his face in. I lacked the courage to do that; or even to verbally call him down on it. What he said was bad

enough. What was worse was that he very apparently treated and considered all this "exclusion" as so very, very natural. He seemingly hadn't bothered to even think about it. He hadn't bothered to consider that people on this campus—people who in every conceivable way had proved themselves his equal or better—were being treated as not quite equal to us "great white Gods."
