

Frosh Battle OSC Rooks Today

This afternoon, Friday, the Oregon Frosh will go against the Oregon State Rooks in Corvallis for their second and final game of the year. The Rooks turned out over 100 men and won their first game 58-7 over Lower Columbia Jr. college while the Ducklings traveled to Arcata, California and absorbed a 13 to 0 defeat at the hands of a strong Humboldt State team. The Ducklings should have a tough time running over the Rooks this afternoon.

The Frosh had only been out for two weeks and were not too

well coordinated for their opener. The Rooks walked over the weak junior college in their lopsided victory. The Rooks had a week longer to practice before their first game than the Frosh.

Thursday, the Ducklings ran through their last drill of the week. They spent some time under Coach Hammer's direction working on fundamentals and running offensive plays.

Hammer will send the full squad of 38, and all will suit up for the game. There have been a few changes since the last game as Phil McHugh has moved from halfback to end and is doing a good job according to the coaches. He turned in a good performance

both offensively and defensively in the Thursday drill. Les Plumb is slated to start at quarterback and will be expecting to play on a wet field.

The dampness will probably hamper the Oregon passing attack which has improved a good deal since the Lumberjack game, but with Jasper McGee and Tom Crabtree leading the way the running attack should be tops. McGee, the big 210 lb. fullback from California, is being pressed for the post by Bill Huffman. According to Hammer the line should turn in a good performance. It is bolstered by boys like Jack Heacock, Spike Hillstrom, and Reanous Cochrane.
