

Millrace Has Chance According To Committee

The immediate problem as phrased by Kieth Fennell, of the Eugene Millrace association, was to keep the race full of water to within six inches of the top in order to improve its looks. City Manager Robert Finlayson agreed to study the problem with the objective of doing so.

The second point, brought up by Sydney Little, dean of the school of architecture and allied arts and chairman of the University planning commission, was encouragement of use of the race for canoeing.

The Portland alumnae group presented a 60-cup coffee urn to the houses.
