

Halberg, Anderson Top UO Scoring; Holland Ranks 3rd

Forward Ed Halberg continued to lead University of Oregon's basketball scorers in games to date according to statistics released by the Oregon athletic news office.

Halberg has pushed home 46 field goals and added 40 free throws for a total of 132 points in Northern Division play, an average of 13.2 markers per game. Following Halberg in the point-making department are center Max Anderson with 119 points and guard Barney Holland with 116 counters. Holland made a big gain on the leaders with his big 43 point series against Washington State last week.

Halberg also leads the team in field goal percentage with a .479 percentage by virtue of 46 baskets in 96 tries at the hoop. Second place in this department is held jointly by Anderson and Bob Stout who both have a .455 average. Anderson has connected on 35 of 77 shots and Stout has hit with 10 of 22.

Most accurate from the free throw line has been Holland who has cut the net with an amazing 28 out of 33 tosses for a spectacular average of 84.8. Howard Page has hit 11 of 14 for second place with a mark of .786 and Halberg is next in line with 40 out of 57 and a percentage of .702.

Anderson and Halberg are staging a two-way battle for the team rebound title. At the present time Anderson is trailing Halberg by three grabs with 94 to Ed's 97.

Anderson has the dubious distinction of being the "hatchet" man of the squad with a total of 36 personal fouls. Guard Ken Wegner, traditionally high in this department, is second with 34 infractions.

As a team the Ducks in their ten division games have piled up a total of 632 points for an average of 63.2 per game. Their opponents have scored 593 tallies for an average of 59.3 per tussle.

Playoff Contests Commence Mon. For IM Champs

Alpha Tau Omega will take to the court against Sigma Chi in what should be the top "A" tournament basketball game next week as the intramural playoffs get underway.

The ATO's and the Sigs, both undefeated so far this season, will match baskets Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 p. m. in the feature tussle of first round action.

Phi Delta Theta, which will go into the single elimination playoff as the favorite to carry off all the marbles, will be idle during the first round. The Phi Deltas drew a bye and will play the winner of the ATO-Sigma Chi battle on Wednesday afternoon.

In the "B" team tourney the only first round game will pit Nestor Hall against Hale Kane on Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 p. m. The other three playoff teams will rest until Wednesday when the Phi Deltas take on Theta Chi and the winner of League three, still undecided, will play the winner of the Nestor-Hale Kane game.

Tournament action will continue through Thursday afternoon when the championship games in both the "A" and "B" tourneys will be played.

(AP) The Milwaukee Braves sold pitcher Vern Bickford to the Baltimore Orioles of the American League Wednesday for an unknown price.

Bickford is 63 years old and joined the Braves in 1948. He had a won-lost record of two and five last year. His major league record is 66 victories and 56 setbacks.

As a part of the deal, the Orioles sent catcher Charley White from their San Antonio farm to the Braves. White hit .274 during the last season.

General Manager John Quinn said both the New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox wanted Bickford but offered only cash.
