### Second Condon Lecture lonight

Ralph Buchsbaum, professor of zoology at the University of Pittsburgh, will deliver the second Condon lecture on "The Sea and the Life Within" tonight at 8 p. m. in the Student Union ballroom.

This second illustrated lecture, "Man Studies and Understands the Sea," was originally scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 11 but was postponed because of illness of the speaker.
