

Ducats Go on Sale For Choir Concert

Tickets for the Mt. Angel Seminary Gregorian Choir concert, Feb. 26, go on sale at the Student Union main desk today, according to Donna Schafer, chairman of the Student Union special attractions committee. Price for students and faculty members is 50 cents, and 85 cents for townspeople.

Because of the limited number of seats in the Student Union ballroom, where the concert will be held, students are urged to pick up tickets before Monday, Feb. 22, when the remainder will be put on sale downtown.

Members of the choir are from the Mt. Angel seminary, 40 miles south of Portland. The seminary as well as a high school for boys, is conducted by the Benedictine monks of the Mt. Angel Abby, founded in 1882.

The tradition of the Benedictine monks was started about 500 A. D. by St. Benedict. These monks have dedicated themselves to the "Work of God." Besides conducting the seminary and the high school, the group publishes a magazine and operates a farm.

College Students Advised To File for Service Test

All eligible college students who plan to take the Selective Service College Qualification test in 1954 should file applications at once, the Selective Service national headquarters advised this week. The tests will be administered on April 22.

An application and a bulletin of information may be obtained at any local board, the national headquarters said. The student should fill out his application immediately and mail it in the special envelope provided.

Applications must be postmarked no later than midnight, March 8. Early filing will be greatly to the student's advantage, according to J. E. Terral, director of the test administration.

Safety Patrol Plans Shrine

A project to build a small shrine to the Virgin Mary, in honor of Marian year, set aside in her honor by Pope Pius XII, has been initiated by members of the Junior Safety patrol of St. Mary's school.

The students plan to build the shrine on their school playground, and are being backed in the venture by Police Sergeant Smart, city director of student safety.

The boys wrote a letter to the Register-Guard editor, in which they said "our shrine would be a lasting tribute of the people of Eugene interested in honoring her (Mary) as Queen of Our City. Our slogan is "A Valentine for Mary's Shrine."

The are asking the co-operation of all Catholics in the city to help finance their plan, and have asked that contributions be mailed to the Marian Shrine fund, c-o Captain Richard Thompson, St. Mary's school, 285 W. 11th.

Danish Authority Visits Art School

Steen Eiler Rasmussen, an authority on architecture and city planning from the University of Copenhagen will visit the University Tuesday and Wednesday.

Rasmussen who is here under auspices of the school of architecture and allied arts will deliver a series of lectures while on campus.

Tuesday, he will speak on "Architecture and Town Culture" in a public lecture in the science auditorium.

On Wednesday Rasmussen will conduct a program on "Danish and Scandinavian Architecture" and will seminar on city planning with a class. Both of these programs will be open only to architecture students.
