Many suggestions were made for improvements and ChuckWiper, Eugene Active Club member in charge of housing, was given many good ideas for possible improvements.

The chief worry of Bouck was the seating problem which always arises on the final two nights of the tournament. The possible idea of reserving more seats was suggested but didn't meet with a favorable reaction. Most of those in attendance agreed that the tourney was for the high schools more than for the general public and that reservation of any more seats would prevent many students from seeing the semi-final and final games of the casaba classic.
