Moroccan Writer Speaks Tonight

A man who once visited King Ibn Saud and King Abdullah of Jordan and published a book about these two monarchs will lecture in the Dad's Lounge of the Student Union at 8 this evening.

Speaking on Morocco, Rom Landau has been internationally acknowledged as the leading authority on that country. He is also the author of a biography on Mohammed V, the present Sultan of Morocco.

. His survey of Morocco was published by the Carnegie Endowment of International Peace in 1952. He is also the author of numerous articles on the area which have appeared in London and American newspapers and magazines. Landau's books have been translated into French, Dutch, Danish, Ger-

During the second world war Landau volunteered for the Royal Air Force and became an air-gunner in bombers. He was later made a member of the Arab Committee of the Intelligence Department in the Foreign Office in Lon-
