The spectrograph, an instrument which analyzes the composition of radiation, was started last March by S. Y. Ch'en, associate professor of physics; Robert B. Bennett, research, and Harold D. Osborn, technichian.

Research grants from the program will participate in work graduate school have assisted the camps in this country, Mexico and instrument financially thus far. Allotments of \$2,000 and \$600 have been given during the past year, with the probable addition of \$200 needed before the work is completed.
