UW Downs Ducks In Pavilion Fray

The Washington Huskies came back with vengeance Saturday stop 50-45 and their narrowest night and downed Oregon's Ducks 67-59 to score their first victory over the Webfoots this year in four tries.

The cagers of coach Tippy Dye were paced to their win by some sharp shooting on the part of forward Karl Voegtlin and center Dean Parsons who connected for 20 and 18 points respectively.

Two early buckets by Voegtlin and another pair by Jim Coshow got Washington off to an early 12-3 lead and the Ducks could never catch up. At the conclusion of the first quarter the Dyemen were ahead by a 18-8 count and at halftime it was 35-26 for the Huskies.

Oregon made a serious threat to catch their foe in the third period as Ed Halberg and Max Anderson led a scoring rush that pulled the Ducks to within one point of the Huskies at 42-41, but. this was the high water mark as far as Oregon was concerned.


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
