And Coffee Minus Cream

The Red Cross recommends that donors avoid fatty or fried foods for a period of four hours before their donation. This includes butter and cream. Fruit or fruit juices, jam, marmalade, honey, preserves, dry toast and crackers may be eaten, along with tea or coffee, with sugar but without cream.

Qualifications Listed

1. A normal, healthy, person weighing at least 110 pounds, between the ages of 21 and 59 inclu-

60th birthday may not donate.

3. Anyone between the ages of 18 and 21 may be a donor with the parents consent.

4. A person who has ever had tuberculosis, undulant fever, jaundice, or who has had major surgery within one year, may not be a donor.

5. A pregnant woman or a mother of a baby under one year May 14 and 15 at the same time of age cannot donate.
