
Summer Field Trip Has Six Openings

Each group will be allowed six minutes for their entire performance, including coming to and leaving the stage. Groups are to bring three copies of their music to eliminations.


Women's eliminations will be held May 5, and men's eliminations will be held May 6. Announcements of finalists will be made May 7, Miss Gerlinger said.


