Armstrong is also a professor of classics and has taught at many schools in the nation, including Brown university, Dartmouth and Whitman college, Walla Walla, Washington. His teaching career began at Rolling college, Florida.

Armstrong holds an A.B. from the University of British Columbia and a Ph.D. in classical philology from Harvard. Born in Canada, the forty-two-yearold president became a citizen of the United States in 1925. He has a wife and four children.

At Whitman, Armstrong became director of the Navy V-12 college training program and assistant, professor of classics in 1943. He became an associate professor of classics in 1945.

Since coming to the Northwest, Armstrong have been appointed a member of the Commission on Higher Schools in the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher School. The young president has been listed in "Who's Who in America?"
