"Homer's Illiad: Ladies Dead and Lovely Knights" will be discussed by F. M. Combellack, associate professor of classic languages and nationally know Homeric scholar. At the beginning of his talk Combellack plans to explain the reason for the subtitle "Ladies Dead and Lovely Knights," which is a quote from William Shakespeare.

Combellack will not discuss the entire "Illiad," but will analyze only a few of the most significant scenes and the personalities of the main characters. The epic is the poetic version of the fall of Troy, and the capturing of the beautiful queen Helen, based on classical Greek mythology. '

## Political Convention Amendment Offered

The Associated Greek Students Tuesday afternoon approved a plan to abolish the all-campus primary, and offered in its place a constitutional amendment which would make it possible for the party to hold a nominating convention, patterned after a national political convention.

AGS also went on record as favoring the formation of the Northwest Federation of Collegiate Leaders, re-establishment of the ASUO entertainment commission and revision of ASUO. senate procedure to include use of standing committees. They, approved two proposed constitutional amendments concerning the election of freshman class officers and the selection of the graduate student member of the Senate.

The amendment suggested by AGS in place of the primary calls for the addition of section VI to article VI of the ASUO. constitution. The party has already circulated petitions to ob-

tain the required 200 signatures, to place the proposal on the ballot for the general elections May

Amendment Proposed

These candidates shall be selected as each of the several parties chooses.
