Ransom Issues

Independent students have a better background for participation in student government because they are not pushed bysocial groups," said Hollis Ransom, United Independent Students' candidate for ASUO president, at a UIS coffee hour, Thursday evening.

"People in student government have to know they can do their job well, without social pressures," he continued, speaking to the group of UIS supporters and candidates who filled their Student Union meeting room to capacity.

Ransom outlined the party platform for the May 5 general elections, and some discussion was held of the issues. The candidates as a whole are supporting the platform, which will be announced in the UIS voters' pamphlet, to be prepared next week.

"We feel we have workable solutions for all the issues in the platform," Ransom said, introducing the points to the group.

Platform Outlined

Points in the platform include:

1. The exchange assembly, "UIS is not in favor of censorship or 'evaluation' of the exchange assembly program, in any form . . . the students in charge of the show are capable of being their own censors. and can function in this capacity. The precedent of censorship in one field may lead to censorship in other fields."

2. Orientation of foreign students. "Some of the orientation and advising of foreign students should be taken over by the ASUO senate. We propose a committee of senators to help the administration in this function to give the foreign students a better view of student life and customs on the campus."

3. All-campus primary. We favor the continuance of the all-campus primary in its present form because it is an effective means to give the individual student more of a voice in the selection of suitable candidates.

Oaths Opposed

4. Faculty loyalty oaths. "We strongly oppose any loyalty caths for the faculty that will muzzle their right of free speech."


5. Athletic cards. "We favor a combined athletic and student body card without a picture; the card would be picked up at the time of registration."

6. Discrimination. "We stand against discrimination in living organizations, honoraries and other campus groups, because such practices are inconsistent with the goals of an institution of higher education."

7. Regional organizations. "We do not favor Oregon's participation in any additional regional organizations until these organizations prove themselves worth the time and money necessary for participation."

Power Sought

8. Student government's power. "More power and meaning should be demanded of, by and for student government. It is important that students have a greater voice in how their activities and lives are run. One way of accomplishing this is the re-establishment and utilization of the ASUO cabinet."
