Lawrence H. Snyder, dean of the graduate school at the University of Oklahoma, will speak on "Human Genetics and Its Modern Application" at the regular meeting of Sigma Xi, national science fraternity, tonight at 8 in Science

Snyder is an authority on the inheritance of blood groups in humans and has published a number of papers on genetics. He also has next school year are due noon May written a widely used textbook on 3. the subject and is an expert on genetic problems of disease.

Snyder took his B.S. at Rutgers in 1922, his M.S. at Harvard in 1924, and Sc.D. at Harvard in 1926. He taught at North Carolina State and Ohio State colleges before going to Oklahoma.

In 1928 and 1929 he served as consul for Venezuela, the nation of his birth, in Philadelphia.

Nadine Conner, Metropolitan opera soprano, will appear Friday at 8 p. m. in McArthur court in the last Civic Music association presentation of this season.

Beginning her study of voice at the University of Southern California, Miss Conner made her professional debut as a soloist over radio station KHJ in Hollywood.

After touring with a theatrical company and singing leading operatic roles with the Los Angeles Opera company, the soprano mar-ried Dr. Laurance Heacock, a Compton surgeon, in 1939 and retired for two years.

Returning to her musical career in 1941, Miss Conner auditioned in New York for the Metropolitan and made her debut there as Pamina in "The Magic Flute." Since then she has become one of the Met's leading sopranos.

The concert will be free to University students on presentation festivities from May 13 to 15. of student body cards.
