

Webfoot Rally Upsets Orangemen Nine, 9-7 Oregon Clinches Dual Meet Crown

Ducks, Beavers Tie for First Place

Don Kirsch's Oregon baseball team tied up the Northern Division pennant race last Saturday afternoon when they came from behind to defeat the Oregon State Beavers, 9-7, in an extra-inning thriller at Corvallis.

The Ducks, who trailed the Beavers by one full game going into this tussle, fought an uphill battle all the way in gaining their close decision.

Pitcher Norm Forbes was the big hero for the winning Webfoots. Forbes pitched the entire tilt and in the last four innings of the game only gave up one scratch hit. Besides his chucking duties, Forbes also took time to lead the devastating Duck attack. Taking over the clean-up spot in the batting order, Forbes lashed out five hits in six times at the plate including a home run and a double.

Wellman Hit Hard

The Ducks pecked away at OSC hurler Norbert Wellman for 19 hits during the game but not until the late innings could they put together a good scoring attack. Ralph Coleman's Corvallis sluggers were on the long end of a 7-3 score going into the seventh frame and appeared to have the fracas all wrapped up. Although being hit consistently, Wellman seemed to have the Oregons well under control as far as runs were concerned.

Then in the seventh Don Kirsch's nine began to find the range on the lanky red-head.

In the eighth the Webfoots struck again. John Keller and Shaw hit back to back doubles and Forbes added a single to bring home two more counters and cut the Beavers lead to 7-6.

Ducks Tie Score

Wellman was still on the hill in the ninth inning despite the consistent drubbing the Duck batters were giving him. But when Neal Marlett and Ron Phillips opened the frame with consecutive singles, Coleman decided his ace chucker had had enough and sent in sophomore Dick Wilson in his place. Pete Williams met Wilson's first delivery for a long fly to center field to score Marlett from third to tie the ball game. Coleman then removed Wilson from the game and put in southpaw Merlin DeHaas. DeHaas re-

tired the next two batters but the damage was already done as far as the Beavers were concerned.

Forbes was moving down the potent OSC batters in clock-like fashion and with the score tied the Ducks felt a new surge of life. They put their opponents down in one-two-three order in the bottom of the ninth as Forbes outsmarted the best of the Beaver batters. Jerry Exely, Jay Dean and Chuck Fisk would do nothing with Forbes' slants.

In the crucial tenth inning Keller opened with a walk. Shaw laid down a sacrifice bunt and was safe on catcher Jack Stephenson's error for OSC. Forbes laid down still another bunt and beat it out ahead of DeHaas' throw. This loaded the bases with no one out. Dick Schlosstein was the next hitter and, although he had failed to hit in five previous trips to the dish, Dick came through mightily on this particular occasion by lining a clean single to left to bring in the two runs that were to prove to be the winning markers.

Duck Linksmen Stop OSC in Close Match

Sid Milligan's University of Oregon golf team had to come from behind last Saturday afternoon to defeat a determined band of OSC divoters by a close 14½-12½ score.

The Beavers caught their opponents completely by surprise in the morning best-ball play and went to lunch with a 6½-2½ lead. But the Ducks pulled themselves together in the afternoon action to score their whisker-thin win.

Oregon's Don Krieger carded a par 72 for medalist honors. Krieger and George Schultz paired up for the top best ball score, a 69.

For the winning Ducks it was the 20th straight ND dual meet triumph. In an earlier match this year the Webfoots won over the Beavers by exactly the same margin.

Two of the closest matches of the day were staged between Larry Trogan of OSC and Howard Zenger of Oregon and Fred Duncan of the Beavers and Al Cross of the Ducks. Trogan edged Zenger 2-1 while Cross outlasted Duncan by the same score.

Biggest upset of the day was Jerry Cloninger's 3-0 triumph over favored Al Mundle of Oregon.

Teams Play Here Monday Afternoon In Second Game

Oregon and Oregon State will play the second game of their important four game series at Howe field Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Ducks and Beavers are currently tied for the league lead and will be battling for the top spot in this afternoon's contest.

Opposing pitchers for the two teams will likely be a pair of left-handed flingers. Coach Ralph Coleman of the Beavers has indicated that he will start Al Guidotti and Don Kirsch of the Webfoots said he would probably open with Trent Huls on the mound.

Other starters for Oregon State will be: Jack Stephenson, catcher; Jay Dean, first base; Chuck Fisk, second base; Bob Buob, shortstop; Ray Rothstrom, third base; Jim Ruggles, left field; Jerry Exley, center field; and Jim Withrow, right field.

For Oregon the probable starters will be: Neal Marlett, catcher; Dick Schlosstein, first base; Jim Johnson, second base; John Keller, shortstop; Pete Williams, third base; Jerry Ross, left field; George Shaw, center field; and Norm Forbes, right field.

After their game today the two teams will wait until next weekend when they will play the final two tussles of their set. They play at Corvallis Friday and Eugene on Saturday.

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Oregon Clinches Dual Meet Crown

Bill Bowerman's Oregon track and field team clinched the Northern Division dual meet title Saturday afternoon when they roared over the Oregon State Beavers, 80-51, at Corvallis.

The result of the meet was never in doubt from the start but OSC made a much better showing in some of the events than they were expected to.

Two met records fell by the wayside during the afternoon of competition. Don Chambers of OSC galloped to a decisive win in the 22-yard low hurdles in the excellent time of 24 seconds flat for a new mark. The other standard which was toppled was by Wayne Reiser of Oregon in the two-mile run. Reiser showed a tremendous finishing kick to record a clocking of 9:30.3, three seconds better than the old mark held by Joe Fisher of the Beavers.

Ducks Win 11 Events

Oregon won 11 of the 15 events on the program. Chambers took both hurdle runs for the Beavers while the other two top places for the men of Hal Moe were Jerry Church in the javelin and Joe Fulwyler in the discus.

In the javelin throw Church won with a toss of 199'4" to hand Oregon's Doyle Higdon his first loss of the season. Higdon finished second with a throw of 185'2½".

Bruce Springbett of the Ducks won both the dash events as expected. He sped home in front of the pack in the 100 in 9.9 seconds and later came back to win the 220 with a time of 22.5 seconds.

Oregon's Fred Jacobs showed very well in the 440-yard dash as he was clocked in the speedy time of 50.4 seconds. Gordon Dahlquist finished second and Doug Talbot third in this event as the Ducks scored a sweep of the places.

Doug Clement breezed home to an easy win in the 880 in the average time of 1:58. No one pressed Doug too seriously during the race.

Bill Dellinger continued his good showing in the mile run as he galloped in ahead of two OSC runners. Dellinger's time was 4:26.9.

Other Oregon winners were Bob Faucett in the high jump, Ben Johnson in the broad jump, Ken Hickenbottom in the pole vault and Ben Lloyd in the shot put.
