

Ron Lowell Wins Emerald Trophy As Top Athlete

Tennis captain, Ron Lowell, was awarded the Emerald Athletic Trophy Saturday night at the All-Campus Sing by Acting Athletic Director Bill Bowerman.

Lowell, a senior from Klamath Falls, is the fourth athlete to be named as a winner of the trophy which has been in existence for four years now. The trophy is awarded annually to a senior athlete on the basis of outstanding achievement in athletics, scholarship and citizenship by a committee made up of both students and faculty members. The trophy is jointly sponsored by the athletic department and the Oregon Daily Emerald.

Besides the trophy, Lowell was presented with a gold "O" lapel pin by Bowerman, who was filling in for Athletic Director Leo Harris, in the East on business. Previous men to win the award have been Jack Keller in 1951, Jack Hutchins in 1952 and Jim Livesay in 1953. It is an interesting coincidence that the four awards have now represented men from four different sports. Keller was a basketball player, Hutchins a track performer and Livesay an All-Northern Division baseball player.

Necessary Requirements
Some of the requirements which are necessary for athletes in order for them to win the award are a 2.5 GPA and at least 150 hours of completed study at the University. There were 29 athletes working for this year's trophy.

In addition to being captain of the tennis team and being a three year letterman in that sport, Lowell had many other campus activities and honors. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the Senior Six, and has compiled a grade point average of 3.94 in his four years at Oregon. He was the top man in his class in both his freshman and sophomore years in school.

Lowell is a four-time winner of the Standard Oil scholarship. A short time ago he was awarded the \$1,000 Kenneth MacKenzie Memorial scholarship to the Oregon Medical school.

Frosh Cindermen Edge OSC Rooks

The Oregon Frosh track and field team scored one of the closest dual meet wins in history last Saturday afternoon at Corvallis when they edged the Oregon State Rooks by the slender margin of 65 2-3 to 65 1-3.

The Ducklings won seven events on the program of 15 and shared the top place in still another. Only double winner of the day for the Frosh was Martin Pedigo who won the broad jump and the high jump.

Pedigo's broad jump of 22' 8 1/2" and his high jump of 6'2" were both outstanding. Other good performances by the Ducklings included a 10.1 100-yard dash by Hank Luomena, a 22.9 220 by Arden Christensen, a 15.6 high hurdles run by Doug Basham, a 12' pole vault by Dave Newland and a 47' 3 1/2" shot put toss by Jack Moad.

Oregon State Wallops Ducks To Move Ahead in ND Race

Webfoots Fall One Full Game Behind

The Oregon State Beavers roared back into first place in Northern Division warfare and crept within one game of clinching the ND crown Monday afternoon when they defeated the University of Oregon, 7-3, at Howe field.

The all-important win, the first for OSC over the Ducks this season, gave Ralph Coleman's nine a won-loss record of ten and four and left them one game in front of the second place Ducks who sport a nine and five mark. All the Beavers need now is one more victory and they will be assured of a NCAA tournament berth.

For the Ducks it was a tough loss to take and of course darkened their hopes of winning their second straight title. Don Kirsch's Webfoots will have to win both of the final two games of their four game set with the Corvallis diamond crew to overhaul them. The last two counters will be played next weekend, Friday at Corvallis and Saturday at Eugene.

Wilson Starts

Coleman, who had indicated that he might start southpaw Al Guidotti in the second game of the series, changed his mind at the last minute. Instead of Guidotti he elected to open with seldom-used right-hander, Dick Wilson. And what a wise choice it turned out to be!

Wilson, possessor of a one won and none lost mark for the season, quieted the Duck bats completely for six innings. Wilson was so effective that the only Oregon hit up to that time had been a second inning single by Bob Wagner. The Ducks finally found the range on the lanky sophomore in the seventh frame and Coleman had to call on Guidotti to put out the fire and finish up the game. But by this time the Beavers had the game pretty well clinched with five runs already scored.

Oregon's pitching was just the opposite of OSC's smooth chucking. Three Duck hurlers tried their luck and all of them had trouble in getting the Beavers out. Trent Huls opened for the Kirschmen and was followed to the hill by Bill Blodgett and Norm Forbes. The first three runs were scored off Huls, the next two off Blodgett and the final pair on Forbes. The two markers scored on Forbes were unearned, however.

Huls Lacks Control

Huls indicated that he wasn't his usual self in the first inning when he walked in the first Beaver run. With one out Bob Boub got life on an error by John Keller. He was forced at second by Jerry Exley but the next batter, Jay Dean, smashed a long double to right field to send Exley to third. Huls walked Chuck Fisk purposely in order to get at Jim Withrow. But with the bases loaded, Huls was

unable to get the ball across and walked Withrow to force in Exley.

The Orangemen struck for their second run in the third inning when Dean opened the frame with a single and came all the way to score on a triple by Fisk to right-center field.

Huls became wild again in the fourth and as a result of three bases on balls and an Oregon error the Staters broke the scoring ice again. This gave Coleman's crew a comfortable 3-0 lead and with Wilson rolling along in fine fashion things looked mighty rosy for the visitors.

Huls settled down somewhat in the next two innings and got the Beavers down without any more runs scoring but he gave way for a pinch hitter in the Oregon half of the sixth inning. Blodgett, Kirsch's first relief choice, had even a tougher time than Huls.

Big Bill got the first two OSC batters out in the seventh but the next two, Wilson and third baseman Ray Rothstrom, hit back to back home runs to increase the Beaver lead to 5-0. Both circuit clouts were well hit line drives which sailed over the left field embankment.

Ducks Find Range

Going into the bottom of the seventh, the Ducks finally began to get onto the slants of Wilson. After John Keller had opened the inning by flying out to center-field, George Shaw followed with a walk and became the first Oregon base runner since the second inning. Shaw's walk seemed to unnerve Wilson. The Northern Division's leading hitter, Norm Forbes, moved into the batter's box to pinch hit for Wagner. On Wilson's second pitch Forbes lined a clean single to right, sending Shaw to third.

Dick Schlosstein followed this with another walk and Wilson

was really in trouble with the bases loaded and only one out. Neal Marlett, the next batter, waited for Wilson's second pitch and poked another single to left to bring in Shaw. By this time Coleman had Guidotti warming up in the bullpen. When Pete Williams smashed a double to center to score Forbes and Schlosstein, Coley signalled in Guidotti and sent Wilson to the showers.

The Webfoots were in an excellent position to tie up the ball game with men on second and third with still only one out. But Guidotti was up to his job and in quick order forced Jim Johnson and pinch-hitter Ron Phillips to ground out and the inning was over.

This three run splurge by the Ducks gave Oregon followers new hope, but another Oregon rally just wasn't in the cards. The Ducks put on a mild threat in the ninth when Schlosstein walked and Johnson got an infield single with two men out but Phillips' infield pop ended the ball game.

The Beavers scored their final two runs in top of the ninth. Withrow's single, a walk to Jack Stephenson and a costly error by Pete Williams loaded the bases and then Buob brought in two tallies with a sharp single through the box.

Duckling Nine Nips Two Foes

The Oregon Frosh baseball team closed its season last weekend when it defeated Medford and Springfield high schools in its final two tussles of the year.

The Ducklings won over Medford, 6-0 on Friday and came back to down the Millers on Saturday by a 9-0 count.

For the season the Ducklings lost only three games, all to the OSC Rooks.

Beaver Netters Drop Oregon, 6-1

Oregon State's varsity tennis squad rolled over the University of Oregon netters 6-1 on the Duck courts in the two teams' second match of the season. OSC won the first outing by a 7-0 score.

Irwin Harris' Beavers dominated play in all the matches except the number one singles fracas where Captain Ron Lowell of the Webfoots upset Ed Dey of the Orangemen by a 4-6, 6-4 and 6-4 tally. Only other Duck player to come close was Don Bonime who won one set from Dick Jabocson of the visitors before going down to defeat.

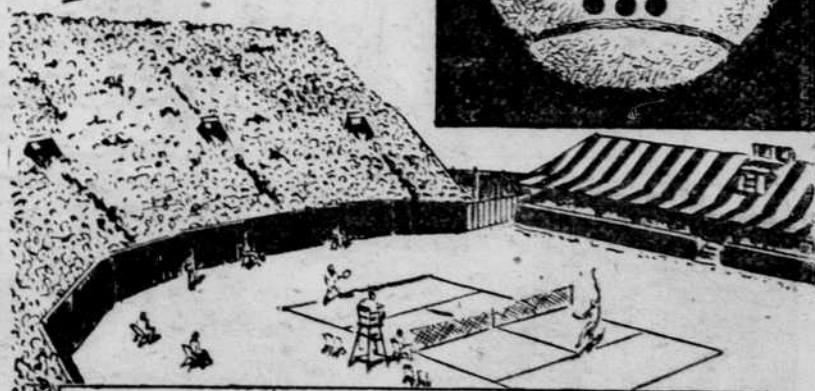
