

Cascade Players Plan Plays for Summertime

"Summer time is theater time in Eugene," says the newly formed Cascade players, a group which will open their first season in Eugene this summer. The group, under the leadership of Horace W. Robinson, associate professor of speech, will present seven plays on a semi-professional basis.

Beginning with a revival of two University theater productions, "The Moon is Blue," and "The Crucible," the group will produce a minimum of five new plays through August 18. "The Moon is Blue" opens June 17 in the arena theater to begin the summer season. "The Crucible" will play main stage June 25 and 26. A nightclub style review, "Club Pacific," will open June 30 and play every Wednesday evening for the summer run in the SU Fishbowl.

"Sing Ho For a Prince," a children's musical comedy based on the fairy tale "The Sleeping Beauty," will initiate the new outdoor theater Wednesday afternoon, July 7, and continue every remaining Wednesday afternoon. "Anything Goes," a popular musical comedy by Cole Porter, opens on the main stage July 8 and plays subsequent Thursday and Friday evenings.

"Mr. Roberts," the popular adult comedy based on life aboard an AK-109 during World War II, plays every Saturday evening beginning July 17. "Forbidden

Fruit," a period comedy, will be presented Tuesday evenings in the outdoor theater beginning July 13.

A meeting is to be held in Villard 102 Monday, at 7:30 when Robinson will meet with any students or Eugene residents interested in participating in the summer program. At this time procedure will be explained, rehearsal periods outlined and first readings held.

Annual Workshop To Be Held Friday

The annual creative arts workshop sponsored by the Student Union will be held Friday, Valerie Cowls, general chairman of the program, has announced.
