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A Growing Campus

The University of Oregon campus is growing up. The campus is being enlarged and improved as new buildings come into use and old buildings have their "faces" lifted.

An article in last Saturday's Emerald indicated that the building program now in progress was part of a ten-year plan authorized by the State Board of Higher Education. The article also stated that the University of Oregon physical plant had completed several projects, "independent of the long-range building program."

Not only is the latter true, but the physical plant has contributed more than any other unit of higher education to create the facilities in Eugene which have become the "new" Oregon campus.

Many major building jobs, such as the new journalism building now under construction, Commonwealth hall and the Science building, have been done by contract, using taxpayers' money, and all are certainly appreciated constructions. Several other buildings, such as Carson hall, the Student Union and the new men's dorm now being built, have been done by a combination of donation and special funds.

The dozens of smaller jobs of rehabilitation must be credited to the physical plant. Friendly, Deady, Villard hall and the school of education, as well as the old University high school, were improved by the school, under the direction of I.I. Wright, superintendent of the physical plant.

When the state built Commonwealth hall it was the physical plant which worked to improve Oregon and Commerce halls in connection with the new structure. The reading room in Fenton hall and the periodical stacks in the same building were a product of the physical plant. The second floor in Johnson was redone to accommodate the administration office.

At the present time, the physical plant is working on an overhaul of Condon hall to give the geology, geography and psychology departments more room. Plans are being made to make room for a museum of natural history in the building now being used by the school of architecture and allied arts.

For the future, the physical plant has several more improvements in mind. For example, along with the construction of new seating for Mac court, being done on contract with money collected by the athletic department, the physical plant is going to provide more and bigger light fixtures throughout the building. According to Wright, the hope to "double the lighting" on the floor of Mac court.

The campus has been improved beyond measure by a physical plant that has not been content with sitting back and letting someone else pay for and do the work of building up the University of Oregon. We are proud of Mr. Wright and his department. (R.M.)

obtain the support of "some of the state's large daily newspapers" in the drive. The third step would be a drive to get all eligible voters on campus to register for coming elections.

The final step, according to the group, would be the circulation of petitions supporting academic freedom. This would, in effect, deny the right of Congressional committees to investigate institutions of higher education, the group said.

Members of the group passed a resolution affirming that the organization was a non-partisan, non-subversive organization dedicated to the principle of academic freedom.


Pre-registration Set For Co-op Nursery
