Although several modifications of the original plans were necessary to bring construction costs down to the \$1,250,000 figure approved by the State Board of Higher Education, Barnhart declared that construction was not cheapened nor quality sacrificed by these modifications.

Non-essentials such as a food conveyer system, dumb waiters and exterior brick dampproofing were eliminated so that the quality of the other features could be maintained. University officials informed the board that the omitted items could be added later if more funds were made
