The Ducks opened their schedule in Seoul, Korea, Aug. 6, four days after leaving Portland. They won the opener against Chosen Christian university 54-42 in a blazing summer sun. Bell paced the Ducks with 10 points as 5000 people jammed a tiny outdoor high school court.

Oregon added two more victories in the next two days by defeating an all-star Korean college team 49-38 as Ross dumped in 10 points, and whipping a Korean Marine corps team 54-42 as Wegner scored 13. The Marines, reputedly Korea's best team, trailed all the way.

From Korea, the Webfoots moved on to Taipeh, Formosa, where they beat the Chinese National All-Stars 47-46 after refusing to settle for a 42-42 tie at the end of regulation play.
