In 1946 Huxley joined the United Nations Educational, Social and Cultural Organization. He became director general of UNESCO a year later. He was an editor for the 14th edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica and a member of the British Broadcasting Company "Brain Trust."

Author and co-author of more than 30 books, Huxley published his two latest books in 1953 on evolution entitled, "Evolution in Action" and "The Evolutionary Process." He has also written in religion, poetry, philosophy, as well as in his field.

Now living in London with his wife and two sons, Huxley is lecturing in the United States this
