## Greek Houses Pledge 627

Oregon's 21 national fraternities and 16 sororities closed one of the most successful rush weeks in recent years this weekend, The Interfraternity council reported Saturday that 356 men had pledged, and the Panhellenic office reported Sunday that 271 women had pledged.

Both IFC and Panhellenic officials had expected successful rush periods as record numbers signed up last week for both men's and women's rushing.

A total of 417 men began rush week, an increase of 27 over the An academic procession 1953 total. In 1953, 332 men pledged fraternities. The 1954 figure represents a substantial increase over 1951 and 1952, in which 131 and 170 men, respectively, pledged Oregon's 21 fraternities. Beta Theta Pi, with 29 men, had the largest pledge class among fraternities.

> The 271 women who pledged Oregon's 16 sororities represent an increase of 35 over last year. A total of 219 women pledged in 1952. This year, 389 women signed up for rushing, as compared to 305 one year ago.

> The number of men pledging has shown an increase each year since the deferred living plan for men was adopted, after decreases in the first years of the four-year-old rule.
