At Corvallis, Coach Taylor declared: "There is absolutely no truth in Mr. Watson's statement. Oregon State does not play that kind of football."

Spec Keene, the OSC athletic director, said: "There's absolutely no truth to it. Kip Taylor and his football staff wouldn't teach that kind of football. It's not the way we play it at Oregon State."

Watson's column continued: "This, I submit, is a matter for Spec Keene, the Oregon State athletic director, to investigate. Thirty-five ball players and some others were in the OSC dressing room, so Keene should have no trouble finding the truth ...

"If Keene has no inclination to investigate this matter then it falls under the jurisdiction of Commissioner Vic Schmidt of the conference. It probably falls under his jurisdiction anyway and flights north from Los Angeles are frequent and
