Allen Colophons

The nine limestone plaques on the front of the new journalism building, Allen hall, emphasize journalism. The carved designs are replicas of old and modern printers marks.

A printer's mark or colophon was a design adopted by a printer to identify more clearly the work of his press. The marks on the front of Allen hall include an early Italian one, from Pravia, Italy, 1453; Others are the marks of famous printers, Fust and Schoeffer, 1457; William Caxton, 1475; Englehard Schultis, 1491; Octavianus Scotus, 1493; Manutius Aldus, 1495; Philippe Le Noir, 1514; Frederic W. Goudy and John Henry Nash, both modern print-
