Webfoots Trip Cal In Berkeley Upset

A determined Oregon team came off the floor in the second quarter and battered the heavily favored California Bears into submission, 33-27, at Berkeley Saturday.

The Ducks were relentless, hard-charging demons from the time that the injured George Shaw entered the game late in the first period. With the Webfoots trailing 13-0 as a result of two Cal touchdowns set up by Oregon fumbles, Shaw reorganized the forces and marshalled the team to a series of scoring drives that rocketed the Ducks to a 33-13 lead and eventual victory.

The win put the Ducks back in the Rose Bowl picture and was convincing proof that Oregon can play the kind of football that the pre-season dopests predicted for them.

Duck Fumbles Cost

Cal was quick to take advantage of Oregon misplays and turned two early Oregon bobbles into touchdowns. Dick James fumbled on the first play from kickoff and the Bears had a score four plays later. Ted Granger crossing into paydirt from the three.

On the next kickoff Johnny Keller fumbled on the second play. With Paul Larson pitching and running, Pappy Waldorf's Bears made it 13-0 with only seven minutes played. It looked like a slaughter until Shaw went in.

Moving most of the way on

the ground, the Ducks struck deeply into California territory. In the second quarter Shaw passed to James and Gaffney to the Bears' five from where James went over.

An interception by Dean Van Leuven with an assist to James and the hard-charging line, which mercilessly rushed the Cal passers, set up the second Oregon tally. Shaw hurled strikes

at fullback—and James and Shaw led the team to a 20-13 margin with Shaw running left and on a fourth down play for the score.

Larson, trying to pass, was swarmed on almost every play and had another toss intercepted by Reeve, who returned it 39 yards to the home team's one. McGee scored on the next play as the stunned Cal players and 31,000 mostly partisan fans read Oregon 26, California 13 on the scoreboard.

Cal moved to its own 34 but fumbled and Spike Hillstrom recovered. Shaw completed two passes to Powell and James tallied from the eight, making the count 33-13.

Starters Take Rest

At this point Shaw and the other Duck regulars left the game and the Bears scored twice. Larson and Tommy Kramer moved on the ground with the first scoring play, a 16-yard pitch from Larson to End Jim Hanifan.

The Blue and Gold Bears made it 33-27 as Larson returned an Oregon punt 56 yards for a TD.

With five minutes left it looked like Cal might pull it out of the fire.
