

He is the author of more than 20 books, his latest being "How Human Rights Got Into the Constitution," published in 1952. His other books include "Freedom of Speech," "The Inquiring Mind," "Free Speech in the United States," and "Government and Mass Communications."

At the present time, Chafee is chairman of the board of directors of the Builders Iron Foundry in Massachusetts. In 1948, he was the United States' delegate to the UN Geneva conference and has been a member of the UN committee on Freedom of Information and the Press since 1947.

He is also a member of the American Bar association, Phi Beta Kappa and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

He was graduated from Brown university with a bachelor of arts degree. He also holds a bachelor of laws degree from the Harvard law school and a doctor of laws degree from St. Johns university in Brooklyn.
