## Littman Defends Social Sciences

The social sciences are coming closer together in that they look for universal aspects of man's life in both the group and Lee, David Goode and Lee the individual, R. A. Littman, associate professor of psychol-ogy, told the browsing room audience last night.

Littman spoke on "Where the Social Sciences Are Going." R. J. Richman, instructor in philosophy, was the discussion leader.

"Social science has been very effective in the world today. During the war, it predicted that Negro and white soldiers could be integrated.

"It has predicted the effects of the recent supreme court's decision on segregation even to the troubled spots in the south.

"Eight months before the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, social scientists knew that the Japanese were ready to surrender. However, this prediction was disregarded by officials in Washington."
