

In October, 1937 on the Oregon campus, a brick building was dedicated with these inscriptions above the front entrances: 'And It Shall Make You Free." It was the new University library.

was established. Before 1950, the book stocks were closed to students. Now they are open so that students may browse and make their own selections.

"I would say the open shelf system has been quite success-'Ye Shall Know the Truth" and ful here, and there has been a growing move in that direction among libraries," Carl Hintz, University librarian, remarked. Recordings Available to Students

In addition to books, pamphlets and reference materials, the largest collections for a college library maintains an audio-visual department on the basement floor. Students may listen to records from a large collection of classical music, language records and famous speeches. Special music booths are provided primarily for use by music and language majors.

"Our basic service is helping persons find what they need,' said Hintz.

A special service added recently is a section of shelves for all new books. The section, located in the card catalogue room, is for the benefit of students who wish to see what new volumes the library has acquired. The books remain on these shelves for ten days before being distributed to their respective sections.
