For the first time in recent years, University students will be able to sit with their dates in the student rooting section at Saturday's Homecoming this game.

Rally Board Chairman Sally Stadelman announced Thursday that special space in the section is being reserved for "piggers" and married students.

The new plan to be in effect will reserve the stands on the east side of the field from the 50 yard line to the south end for students.

Student seating will be divided will sit between the 30 and 50 yard lines, women will occupy seats between the 15 and 30, and the rest of the space between the 15 yard line and the end of the stands will be reserved for the piggers.

The innovation will be the first Corvallis Nov. 20.
