The soprano will also do a group of Italian songs in Italian, and a series of French numbers in French.



It was Weigert who readied the great Kirsten Flagsted, Miss Varnay's predecessor in the Bruennhilde and Isolde roles, for her Metropolitan successes.

Miss Varnay arrived in Eugene Wednesday and has been resting for her performance at the Osburn hotel.
