

PATERA, SHAW NAMED

UCLA Places Four Men On AP Conference Team

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The unbeaten Bruins of UCLA, as might have been expected, dominate the 1954 All-Pacific Coast conference football team as selected by the Associated Press.

Champion of the conference for the second straight year, UCLA placed four players on the AP first team and four more on the mythical second team.

Team Listed

The overall selections, released Wednesday after a tabulation of votes by AP member football writers up and down the Coast:

The backfield:

Paul Larson, California; George Shaw, Oregon; Lindon Crow, Southern California, and Bob Davenport, UCLA.

The line:

Ends—Jim Hanifan, California, and Bob Long, UCLA.

Tackles—Jack Ellena, UCLA, and Ed Fouch, USC.

Guards—Jim Salsbury, UCLA, and Jack Patera, Oregon.
Center—Matt Hazeltine, California.

Eight of the players selected were topheavy choices, and in the instances of Larson, Shaw, Davenport Hanifan Ellena and Salsbury, they were practically unanimous.

There was no reluctance by the voters in placing two T-quarterbacks, Shaw and Larson, in the first team backfield.

Shaw, Larson Unusual

Both are somewhat rare in T-calling circles, of course, in that neither is restricted to any one specialty, such as passing. Both are willing and able to run or pass, which accounts for the fact that Shaw and Larson wound up 1-2 in total offense in the national statistics.

Sports Editor Hank Hollingsworth of Long Beach, explaining that he couldn't leave either off the team, summed it up nicely when he noted: "So I shifted Larson back to halfback, where he belongs anyhow." Larson formerly played halfback at Berkeley.

Davenport, the 193-pound

from Strawberry Canyon, won out decisively, if not by a landslide, while Fouch, USC's co-captain, was voted in over Ron Aschbacher of Oregon State, Joe Ray of UCLA, Mario De Re of USC, and others.

Perhaps the closest ballot battle was for the second guard position, behind Salsbury. At issue were Patera and two other UCLA stalwarts, Sam Boghosian and Hardiman Cureton. There simply isn't much to choose between either of the trio.

Heisman Award Goes to Ameche

Alan Ameche, Wisconsin's All-American fullback, was named by the New York Downtown Athletic club Tuesday as the 20th winner of the Heisman Memorial Trophy, awarded annually to the outstanding football player in the nation.

Oregon's George Shaw was eighth in the voting with 182 points. A total of 1328 votes were cast by sports writers and sportscasters in the poll.

Ameche led runner-up Kurt Burris, Oklahoma center, by more than 200 votes. His total

was 1068 to 888 for Burris. Howard Cassady, the Ohio State halfback, was a close third with 810.

Following the three leaders were Ralph Guglielmi, Notre Dame, 691; Paul Larson, California, 271; Dick Moegle, Rice, 258; Jack Ellena, UCLA, 193; Shaw, 182; Pete Vann, Army, 134; Bob McNamara, Minnesota, 104; Bud Brooks, Arkansas, 93, and Calvin Jones, Iowa, 78.
