

Billed as "The West's finest basketball pavilion," the re-modeled building now has a seating capacity of 10,000. Cost of the remodeling was \$275,000.

Two new balconies have been added to the pavilion and all side posts have been removed in an effort to prevent any obstructions to the view of the floor. The balconies are supported by two trusses constructed on the

### **Convenient Balcony**

The new balcony seats are all within 12 rows of the bleacher seats on the main floor. This arrangement gives Oregon basketball fans the closest proximcourt in the west, according to Ted Bouck, athletic business manager.

A new stair tower has been constructed at each of the four corners of McArthur court for easy access to the new balconies.
