Langlie Proclaims Lewis, Clark Saga

OLYMPIA (AP)—Gov. Arthur B. Langlie has joined the governors of Oregon, Montana, Idaho and North Dakota in proclaiming the year 1955 as the Lewis and Clark Sesquicentennial.

"One of the most thrilling sagas of American history was the immortalized expedition 150 years ago of Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark," Langlie said.

"Their's was one of the greatest frontier discoveries of recent time as they pressed onward for 18 months to establish American claims to the vast unknown lands west of the Mississippi River."

Langlie said the two young Army captains "established America's strongest title to the priceless lands of the Northwest" as they traveled across the territory now known as North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

Circulating the publication as a supplement or insert in the Emerald was suggested.

Other suggestions included pooling the efforts of all the schools in the Northwest to produce the publication and producing it as a publication independent of the University.

No action was taken at the two-hour meeting but a group of three persons volunteered to investigate the entire situation and to draft a concrete report for the publications board.

First prize will be \$100, second, \$50, and five \$25 prizes will be awarded winning designs by the Tile Council.

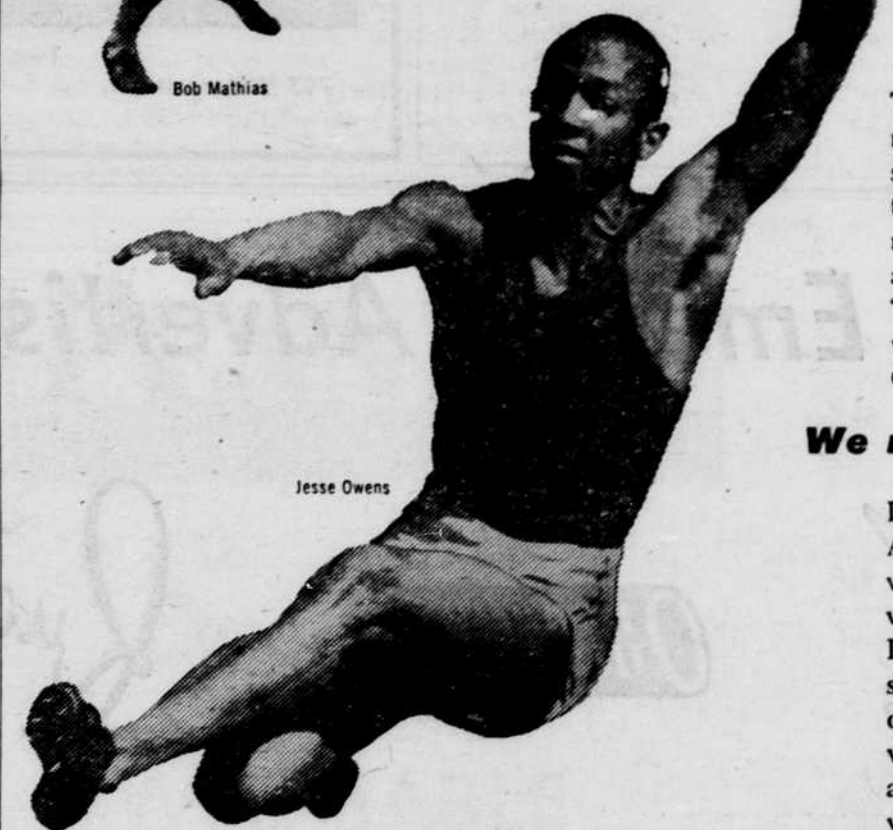
