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Sig Eps Lead Pledge GPA List

Sigma Phi Epsilon pledge class led the men's houses in fall term grades with a 2.441 grade point average. Zeta Tau Alpha led the sororities with a 3.22 GPA.

Second and third place spots were taken by Phi Sigma Kappa, 2.402, and Sigma Alpha Mu, 2.313. Alpha Phi, 2.89, and Alpha Delta Pi, 2.70 were second and third for women's houses.

The GPA totals are based on student pledges who are carrying at least 12 hours.

Comparison of pledge class grades of last year show a higher percentage of men making above a 2 point. In 1953 there were 275 pledges. From these, 131 men made below a 2 point. This year 284 men pledged. Of the pledges 123 did not make their grades.

Sororities pledged 257 women in fall term of 1953 and 50 did not make their house grade requirements. In 1954 there are 289 women pledges and 53 of them did not meet house grade requirements.

Considering the fact that fall term enrollment increased almost 25 per cent over last year's, the grade average is higher than last year.

Both Houses For Statehood

WASHINGTON - (AP) - Bipartisan support to give statehood to both Alaska and Hawaii developed in the Senate Thursday even as President Eisenhower called for early action on admission of Hawaii but delay for Alaska.

Twenty-five senators—including 18 Democrats, five Republicans and Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore)—joined with Sen. Murrell (D-Mont), incoming chairman of the Senate Interior committee, in introducing a combined Alaska-Hawaii bill.

The proposed legislation is identical with that passed by the Senate last spring but which failed to clear the House Rules committee.

It would conflict with what is believed to be one of the President's principal objections to admission of Alaska—the need for a buffer defense zone facing the possible threat of a Russian move across the narrow water barrier dividing it from Alaska.

The President made no reference to specific objections to Alaska in his State of the Union message but said:

"As the complex problems of Alaska are resolved, that territory should expect to achieve statehood. In the meantime, there is no justification for deferring the admission to statehood of Hawaii. I again urge approval of this measure."

Panel Blasts UO Activities

A heated discussion of the University's "paternalistic" attitude regarding student activities resulted at Thursday night's NAACP forum, "The Role of the American University in Making Democracy Work."

The forum panel was composed of Herber Bisno, assistant professor of sociology; Donald DuShane, director of student affairs, and Donald E. Tope, professor of education. Herman Cohen, assistant professor of speech, served as moderator.

Bisno provided the controversy when he asserted that Universities insulate the student from practicing democracy as a student and yet expect him to exercise his political and social responsibilities after leaving the institution.

"Student Government Is Fallacy"

Bisno pointed in particular to the fallacy of student government and he expressed the belief that in student government manipulation to get elected often exceeds the action after getting elected. He pointed in particular to the limitations placed on student activity by the University administration that do not permit student action.

DuShane defended administrative policies targeted by Bisno. DuShane said that in its present

frame of mind, the student affairs committee would approve the appearance on campus of student groups such as "The Associated Anarchists of the World" or a student group dedicated to collective bargaining in the realm of student wages.

Rising to Bisno's assertion that Oregon's political parties are ineffective and not representative, and that faculty membership on student committees did not insulate the student, Oregon is as close to the ideal of student democracy as practicable.

Fail to Accept Challenge

DuShane said that in at least one instance Oregon students received encouragement of the administration in the goal to self-government, and yet failed to accept the challenge. He pointed to the honor code program, saying that "students were not willing to accept the responsibility of administering the honor code."

Bisno, however, in spite of DuShane's defenses, felt that student government at Oregon left much to be desired both regarding faculty insulation of student groups and the regulations set down by the University for student behavior.

Stock Prices Remain Low

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market rallied Thursday after two selling waves, but prices remained battered down severely in the late afternoon.

It was the market's second straight major break since the federal reserve boosted margin requirements to 60 per cent from 50 per cent.

Numerous prices were down 1 to 5 points and some were more sharply depressed.

Selling was exceedingly heavy at an estimated six million shares. That total is in the neighborhood of the 5,932,000 shares traded at the outbreak of World War II in 1939.

Wednesday's market broke heavily on the heels of the federal reserve move which was regarded as a warning that the bull market was getting out of bounds.
