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Costa Ricans Fear Invasion

WASHINGTON-(AP)-Costa Rica said Sunday it is gravely threatened by "an army of adventurers training openly in Nicaragua" and will ask the Organization of American States to take action Monday to keep the peace.

The OAS Council, composed of representatives of the 21 American republics, called an extraordinary session here Monday forenoon to hear Costa Rica's charge of an invasion plot by Nicaragua.

Presidents of the two countries have been feuding for more than a year. Anastasio Somoza, veteran president and strong man of Nicaragua, charged last April that an unsuccessful attempt to assassinate him was "plotted and directed in Costa Rica." President Jose Figueres, whose liberal policies in Costa Rica have caused opposition political attacks, charged that a similarly unsuccessful attempt to overthrow his government last July was "originated in Nicaragua."

Fernando Fournier, undersecretary of foreign affairs of Costa Rica, flew to Washington Sunday to help Ambassador Antonio Facio present his country's case to the OAS. Fournier told a reporter that Nicaragua "is a flagrant and repeated disturber of the peace" and is plotting to invade Costa Rica.

Nicaragua has repeatedly de-

nied any such intentions and charged that President Figueres "is trying to stir up imaginary international incidents to divert attention from charges of corruption and other internal troubles in his own government."

Costa Rica's appeal to the OAS charged that "an American government" sent "a fleet of 10 military transport planes, fully manned" into Nicaragua, which "convinces the government of Costa Rica that the hour for launching an attack has arrived."

PSC Wants SU Building

Chancellor Charles D. Byrne announced last weekend a plan to construct a \$600,000 student union building for Portland State college in conjunction with the classroom structure now awaiting legislative approval.

The building, which will be built from non-tax funds, will be constructed on Montgomery street between Park and Broadway. It would be located one block south of the present Portland State extension center.

Byrne said that the building would house a cafeteria, student body offices and seminar and social rooms. He pointed out that these facilities are just as badly needed as classrooms by PSC.

Senator Wants Dulles at Home

WASHINGTON-(AP)-A report sharply criticizing frequent trips to Europe by Secretary of State Dulles and his predecessors as damaging to the prestige of U.S. ambassadors abroad was released by Sen. Bridges (R-NH) Sunday.

The report, which drew no immediate comment from Dulles, was prepared by Julius Klein, Chicago public relations man and a reserve brigadier general. Bridges, outgoing chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, made it public without comment.

The document was entitled "report on European Mission by Brig. Gen. Julius Klein, special consultant to Subcommittee on Armed Services, Committee on Appropriations, U.S. Senate."

In a brief accompanying statement, Bridges' office described Klein, a familiar figure in Washington Republican circles, as a nonpaid consultant to the Subcommittee and a one-time adviser to the Armed Services Committee.

Reporting his findings on a trip abroad last September and October, Klein said:

"One of the disconcerting facts I found about American diplomacy in Europe was that we ourselves persist in undercutting the very emissaries we have assigned to represent us abroad.

"I was fortunate enough to be in Europe when Secretary Dulles

made his contributions to the discussions that led to formulation of the plan for Western European Union. I therefore had an opportunity to see the secretary under the most creditable circumstances.

"As admirable as was the part he played, I feel impelled to offer the judgment that it is a mistake to send our Secretary of State to Europe as often as we have..."

Instead, he suggested that European statesmen come to this country if they feel they must talk to its top diplomatic officer.

Klein also objected to what he termed conflicts and confusions between the various representatives this country has in many European nations.

At the same time, Klein had high praise for many U.S. agencies and individuals in Europe, including the Air Force.

Another "millrace clean-up" will be among the first steps taken by the newly formed millrace council.

The group, which met for the first time Thursday night, elected Andy Berwick chairman; Kay Patch, secretary, and Don McIntyre, treasurer.

The council consists of representatives of the ten fraternities and sororities along the millrace. It will "take immediate steps toward restoring the millrace and will try to gain support of the entire campus," according to Miss Patch.

Each member of the council will donate five dollars from his organization to create an immediate treasury, Miss Patch announced.

It was also decided that all organizations represented in the Millrace council will not throw debris into the millrace. Any violation will be reported at the council meetings and a \$10 fine will be imposed on the parties responsible.

White Shirt Sections To Occupy Bleachers

Both the east and west sides of the bleacher sections in McArthur court will be converted into white-shirt sections for tonight's Oregon-Washington State game because of action taken by the ASUO rally board.

The entire east side, behind the players' benches, will be occupied by men in white shirts, in addition to the lettermen's section.

Women, in white blouses, will sit in the north half of the west side. The south half will contain another white-shirted men's section.

DANCE DECORATIONS

Fire Risk Told To UO Groups

Lester Barker, chief of the Eugene bureau of fire prevention, has issued a reminder to groups holding dances that all decorations must be flame proof.

A city ordinance requires that all combustible decorative material, including curtains, acoustical materials, streamers, cloth paper, straw, vines, leaves, trees and moss, but not including floor covering, be flame proof.

Saturation Required
A mixture of one part water glass (sodium silicate) and two parts water sprayed or brushed on both sides of paper will make it fireproof, according to Barker. The paper must be well saturated in the solution to be effective.

Any use of water colors should be applied after the treatment since the solution will make the colors run. Care should be used in using the solution near wood floors because it cannot be removed except by sanding the floor, Barker said.

The treatment, Barker an-

nounced, cannot be used on crepe paper. If crepe paper is desired, only the flame proof type should be used.

Cloth Mixture Given

A mixture of nine ounces of borax, four ounces boric acid and two quarts of hot water is recommended for cloth.

Dip the material in the solution, wring it out and dry. If the material is to be ironed do not use too hot an iron as it will stick. The treatment, Barker said, will last about one year or until it is washed or cleaned.
