

Arrests Break Bogus Bill Ring

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Secret Service said Sunday 12 persons have been arrested in three states and more than \$245,000 in bogus money seized in the breakup of a ring that distributed counterfeit \$20 bills.

Arrested here were five men and an unidentified 17-year-old strip teaser. Two of the men were actors arrested at a theater while Secret Service agents ripped up backstage flooring during a performance of "Charley's Aunt" to seize two bags. Agents said the bags contained \$9,000 in the fake bills.

Two Arrested New Year's Day
The roundup included two arrests New Year's morning in Dallas, Tex., followed by two in Chicago and two in San Rafael, Calif. Guy S. Spaman, Secret Service agent in charge here, said all suspects were charged with possessing and passing counterfeit \$20 bills except Glenard Elmer Schmidt, a printer here, who was charged with manufacturing them.

Spaman said Schmidt was in the printing business in suburban Bell and produced the bills by a photoengraving process. Spaman said the bogus bills had the serial number 01137932A and bore a poorly done picture of President Jackson.

Bills Still in Circulation
The Secret Service agent added that many of the counterfeit 20s may still be in circulation in the hands of innocent persons.

The 12th arrest came Sunday when Roger Haizlip, 29, of Los Angeles, was taken into custody. Simultaneously Spaman disclosed the arrest Friday night of Ralph E. Guffey, 25, also of Los Angeles. Spaman said Guffey had 20 of the fake bills on his person.

The same evening actors George W. Lewis and John B. Roche were arrested during the

stage performance at the Carousel Theater. The Secret Service agent said Lewis stuffed a couple of bags under the stage and that agents ripped up the flooring to find the bags and counterfeit money.

Show Goes On
"The show went on, for the first act," Spaman said, "But our agents grabbed Lewis during intermission."

Lewis had a leading role and the performance ended after the arrest. It was reported the management refunded patrons' money.

Spaman said Millard O. Patterson, San Francisco, and Kenneth A. Scott, Bristow, Okla., were arrested in Dallas on New Year's morning. He said they had driven from Los Angeles to Las Vegas, Nev., "scattering" the bills, returned by air to Los Angeles and on a tip from the Las Vegas sheriff were arrested when they landed in Dallas.

M-C Sought
In San Francisco John Sparrow of the U.S. Attorney's Office said Danny Mills, a night club master of ceremonies, is sought as a fugitive.

Two alleged members of the West Coast counterfeit ring seized in Chicago with \$100,000 in bogus \$20 bills will be arraigned Monday, the Secret Service said.

They are William Guren and Robert Durand. The Secret Service said they arrived by plane from San Francisco Tuesday with a suitcase crammed with the counterfeit bills.

Agents arrested the two men Saturday outside a store where authorities said the men bought a jewel case and some stockings with counterfeit money.

They will be arraigned on charges of possessing counterfeit money.

New Interest Aroused By Missing Diplomats

LONDON - (AP) - Members of Parliament are putting new pressure on the Foreign Office to tell all it knows about the two British diplomats who disappeared behind the Iron Curtain in 1951. There appeared to be a growing conviction that the story behind the flight of the two is being hushed up.

The pair—Donald Duart MacLean, 38, and Guy Francis De-Money Burgess, 40—vanished May 26, 1951, after stepping off an excursion boat at St. Malo, France. Two years and four months later, MacLean's American-born wife, Melinda, slipped out of sight in Switzerland with

her three children, presumably to join her husband.

Keynoting the new demands that the mystery be cleared up, Capt. Henry Kerby, a Conservative member of the House of Commons, said in a telephone interview Sunday:

"Western security is involved in this case. We should be told how come these two men with such notorious records could get such important appointments in the Foreign Office only to skeddoodle, and we should be damn sure it can't happen again."

All the British Foreign Office has said officially is that it can be assumed Burgess and MacLean and Mrs. MacLean are behind the Iron Curtain. They have been variously reported in Moscow, Prague and Budapest, among other places, by diplomats and refugees coming to the West.

The pro-labor Sunday Pictorial said Sunday the missing British diplomats now are working in the Kremlin for the Soviet Foreign Ministry. The paper said at least 14 members of Parliament know what the two are doing and how they made their getaway.
