

Ducks Host Cougar Five

Oregon goes after undisputed possession of second place in the Northern Division basketball race tonight when the Ducks entertain Washington State at McArthur court.

The Ducks split a pair with Coach Jack Friel's Cougars at Pullman last week and will be slight favorites to beat WSC in the series here tonight and Tuesday. The luckless Cougars arrived in Eugene yesterday from Corvallis where they lost two games to the league-leading Oregon State Beavers Friday and Saturday.

Bennink Key Man

Much of Oregon's success will depend on stopping the Cougars' Ron Bennink, the All-Conference forward with the sharp shooting eye. The ace forward accounted for 39 out of 110 points WSC scored against the Beavers last weekend and also had a 20-point night against the Ducks last Monday.

Webfoot Coach Bill Borchert will attempt to hold down Bennink using big Ray Bell, the Klamath Falls towhead, against the Cougar star on defense. Bell was praised by Borchert after last Tuesday's Duck win over WSC for holding Bennink scoreless from the field while he was guarding the veteran all-star.

Washington State is currently occupying the ND cellar after losing the recent series to the Beavers while Oregon is tied for second with Washington and Idaho with 1-1 records. Borchert will be pulling out all stops in an effort to gain full possession of second place in the league and has been working the Webfoots hard all week to correct mistakes spotted in last week's series.

Nelson Impressive

Oregon will probably start its usual five of big Jim Loscutoff and Bell at forwards, Max Anderson at center, and Howard Page and Phil McHugh at guards. Sophomore transfer LeRoy Nelson from Lower Columbia junior college will likely see some action in the series after looking impressive in workouts last week.

Other Ducks likely to see considerable action include Forwards Jerry Ross and Ed Bingham and Guard Jack Sherman. Following this series the Webfoots travel to Moscow, Idaho, for their first pair of the season with the Idaho Vandals. In other conference action, Oregon State entertains Washington at Corvallis Friday and Saturday in a vital series toward deciding the conference champion.

College Players Win Hula Bowl

HONOLULU - (AP) - Quarterback Paul Larson of California and Fullback Carroll Hardy of Colorado passed and ran the College All-Stars to a 33-13 victory Sunday over the Hawaii All-Stars before 21,000 in the ninth Hula Bowl game.

From the opening kickoff of the annual island classic the outcome of the contest, played in shirtsleeve weather between the collegiate cream of the mainland and five pro players buttressing local military and Hawaiian players, never was in doubt.

The collegian line, including Jack Patera of Oregon, ripped big holes for Hardy, Dick Moegle of Rice, Larson, and Primo Villanueva of UCLA.

A collegian scored in every period, Larson going over in the final minute of play for a last score.

Quarterback Otto Graham of the Cleveland Browns and End Gordon Soltau of the San Francisco 49ers sparkplugged the Hawaii team but it was Marine Skipper Dyer who paved the way for the first of Hawaii's two touchdowns.

There was one flareup of tempers during the game when All-American Jack Ellena of UCLA and Marine Long Andreason exchanged blows. Neither was ejected.

Larson figured in every scoring drive and set up the final score with a 29-yard toss to UCLA's Villanueva.

Hardy and Dyer were selected as outstanding players for each team.

NCAA to Study Football Rules

NEW YORK-(AP)-The NCAA football rules committee begins its deliberations here Monday with the general idea that the rules are in pretty good shape as they stand.

In line with their attitude of a year ago, the ten members of the body are expected to make few, if any, changes in the code but rather to concentrate on safety measures. Frank G. Mc-

Cormick represents the Pacific Coast conference.

The influential coaches' rules committee has suggested three changes to the national group and one NCAA committee member said that he expected one of them, the proposal to relax the substitution rule, would go through.

"Otherwise I think we have a pretty good game now," he commented.

The coaches' proposal is that the four-minute "segment" at the end of each half, when players who have been removed from the game are allowed to re-enter, should be eliminated entirely.

Player Could Re-enter

Instead, a player who starts a quarter of the game should be allowed to leave the game and re-enter once during that period. But a player who did not start the quarter would not be permitted to return once he had gone out.

That would permit a coach to take out a player for a "breather" or to examine an injury without losing him for an entire period. It also would permit limited use of conversion kickers or other specialists.

Coaches Influential

The NCAA committee doesn't always follow the coaches' suggestions to the letter, but in general, the word of the coaches carries much weight.

The rise in football fatalities during the past season is also a matter of grave concern to the rules committee. Most of the deaths have been ascribed to faulty equipment, especially headgear.

IM Hoop Action Planned Today

Oregon's intramural basketball program opens this afternoon as Beta Theta Pi and Alpha Tau Omega clash in the opening A league game at 3:50 on court 40.

Delta Tau Delta and Sigma Chi meet in the second game at 4:35 and Theta Chi and Sigma Nu clash in the final game of the afternoon at 5:15.

Phi Delta Theta, the defending class A champion, sees its first action Tuesday against Delta Upsilon. B league action is slated to begin Friday.

Single elimination play in intramural handball also begins today with Sigma Nu meeting Kappa Sigma.
