Historical Group Elects Stephenson

W. H. Stephenson, professor of history, was elected chairman of the American history awards committee for the Pacific coast branch of the American Historical association at the close of the 50th annual meeting at the University of Southern California Dec. 29.

The committee, which Stephenson now heads, annually selects the best book west of the Rocky mountains on American history.

Stephenson, who has been at Oregon since 1953, was editor of the Mississippi Valley Historical review, principal journal of American history in the country, during the years 1946-53. Previously he was editor of Journal of Southern History and is currently serving as editor of a cooperative ten volume history of the South.

Stephenson was selected to deliver the annual Walter Lynwood Fleming lectures in Southern history at Louisiana State university in Baton Rouge in March.

Stephenson received his B.A. (1923) and M.A. (1924) at Indiana university, Ph.D. (1928) at Michigan university, Litt.D. (1950) at Duke university and LL.D. (1953) at University of North Carolina. Before coming to Oregon, he taught at Tulane university, the University of Kentucky and Louisiana State university.

Traffic Accidents Claim 412 Lives

SALEM-(AP)—Oregon traffic accidents killed 412 persons in 1954, an increase of 22 over the 1953 total, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry said Thursday.

The record came in spite of the fact that the number of accidents and injured persons dropped an estimated 20 per cent during the year.

The death toll was boosted by an unusually large number of accidents in which more than one person was killed. There were 36 multiple-death accidents.

McCarthy Begins New Army Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who has renewed his demand for a new Senate investigation of the Peress case, left Washington unexpectedly Sunday night for an undisclosed purpose.

McCarthy, who is still chairman of the Senate Investigation Subcommittee, had called a closed meeting of the committee Monday to consider the Army's chronology of the Peress case.

This meeting, it was learned, has been postponed until at least Wednesday.

Destination Unknown

McCarthy told an associate he was leaving town unexpectedly and would be back probably Wednesday. He gave no clue as to the purpose of the trip or as to where he was going.

McCarthy went into action soon after the Army issued a report Friday night on Dr. Irving Peress. Peress, a dentist and

former Army major was given an honorable discharge ahead of schedule last February after McCarthy had accused him of being a "Fifth Amendment" Communist and demanded that he be court-martialed.

Army Explains Action

The Army's new report on the case said Lt. Gen. Walter L. Weible, deputy chief of staff for administration, and Army Counselor John G. Adams, made the decision to grant Peress' request for discharge last February.

Sen. McClellan (D-Ark) is to succeed McCarthy as chairman when the senate committees are reorganized.
