

Oregon Congress Speedy On First Day of Session

SALEM-(AP)-The Oregon legislature lost no time getting down to business at the opening of its 48th session Monday, working through preliminaries in clock-like order and even starting more than a score of bills toward committee consideration.

In rapid order, the Senate and House completed formal organization at the morning session. They met jointly for the inauguration of Gov. Paul Patterson and heard his address on problems that will confront the lawmakers in the weeks to come.

Tuesday, the No. 1 committee, Ways and Means, will meet to begin wrestling with the question of money for state activities. The governor described it as the prime one, because his budget contains a \$63,000,000 deficit.

Republicans strongly endorsed the governor's message, in which he flatly opposed a sales tax. He recommended a state property tax and removing the federal income tax exemption in computing state income taxes. He also opposed a gasoline tax increase.

Democrats complained the governor wasn't specific enough, and they criticized him for not favoring more aid for public schools and for not making a recommendation on the proposed Columbia Basin Compact.

The first surprise of the day came with announcements of committee assignments by Senate President Elmo Smith, John Day, and House Speaker Edward A. Geary, Klamath Falls.

None of the six Senate Democrats won a chairmanship. Only two House Democrats were named to head committees.

Senators dropped 26 bills into the legislative mill, and representatives added five more. They called for higher pay for school teachers, non-partisan election of county officers, and repeal of the 1953 law which bans picketing unless the pickets have a contract as bargaining agent.

Senator S. Eugene Allen, Port-

land, put in a bill which would call a convention in 1959 to write a new constitution. It would be composed of 60 delegates, whom the people would elect in 1958. This bill would be referred to the people.

President's Aide Discloses Ike's Religious Convictions

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top White House aide disclosed some details of the religious life of President Eisenhower Monday. He told how the President revised his State of The Union message last week to emphasize a conviction that "man's spirit must be released for his work on earth."

Gabriel Hauge, an administrative assistant, spoke at a session of the National Lutheran Educational Conference, meeting in connection with the annual convention of the Association of American Colleges, which meets here Tuesday through Thursday.

Hauge is the son of a retired Lutheran minister and is himself a graduate of Concordia College, a Lutheran institution at Morehead, Minn.

"The President worked a long time on his State of The Union speech," Hauge said, "but at the end he sensed something was missing. So he sought to inject into it what he considered essential from the point of view of the fundamental way of American life."

Morse Given Foreign Relations Assignment

WASHINGTON-(AP)-Senator Wayne L. Morse, the Oregon Independent who lost his two big committee posts two years ago after he broke with the Republicans, got a prized new assignment Monday. He'll serve on Foreign Relations.

Democrats filling the majority sides of all the Senate committees also ditched the cherished seniority rule enough to give coveted assignments to two veterans newly returned as freshmen—Senators Barkley of Kentucky and O'Mahoney of Wyoming.

Barkley was assigned to Foreign Relations and also to the Finance committee; O'Mahoney to the Judiciary and Interior committees.

Morse was assigned by the Democratic steering committee not only to the Foreign Relations committee, also to Banking and Currency.

The two committee seats Morse lost when the Republicans organized the Senate in 1953 were on armed services and labor.

Senators Kefauver of Tennessee, Lehman of New York and Long of Louisiana all had bids in for the foreign relations spots that went to Morse and Barkley. Lehman and Senator Pastore of Rhode Island wanted the Judiciary seat that was given to O'Mahoney.

Nevertheless, Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the majority leader, said all was harmonious and unanimous in the steering committee's decisions.

To round out their minorities on each of the Senate committees, the Democrats made other new assignments. They included: Neuberger, Oregon, to the Interior, Post Office and Civil Service and Public Works committees.

Johnson expressed pleasure at Morse's assignments, saying he "would serve with distinction in any post."

Fortune Teller Laments Lost Psychic License

PORTLAND (AP) — An 85-year old fortune teller reported to police Monday that somebody stole her city psychic reading license from under the mattress of her bed.

Her psychic powers aren't any help in locating the missing documents, Aldora K. Hamilton said. "I can only do it for other people."

Costa Rica and Nicaragua Told To Keep Peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Council of the Organization of American States urged Costa Rica and Nicaragua Monday to keep the peace, pending a review Wednesday of Costa Rica's charges that it is threatened with an invasion.

The Council decided after three hours of debate that the "circumstances" are not such as to require immediate action. It voted unanimously to postpone action until another emergency session Wednesday afternoon after its members, representing the 21 American republics, have had opportunity to consult with their home governments.

Costa Rica charged Nicaragua is training an "army of adventurers for the obvious purpose" of invading Costa Rica. It said Nicaragua planned to disguise the invasion as an internal revolution within Costa Rica.

In a note to Council President Jose Mora of the OAS Council Saturday night, Costa Rica asked that the foreign ministers of the America's be called into emergency session to consider the situation.

Nicaragua denied the charges at Monday's session, and said "there is widespread and serious discontent in Costa Rica." It said Costa Rica's charges against Nicaragua have "no basis whatever in fact."

Ambassador Antonio Facio of various countries had proposed a delay of a few days, he agreed.

Appearance of Dead Sharks Puzzles City

GEARHART (AP) — Three dead basking sharks, all about 25 feet long, washed up on the beach near here Sunday and the State Highway Department plans to bury them Tuesday.

R. M. Smith, department supervisor at Astoria, said the sharks did not appear to have been injured and cause of death was not determined.

One of the sharks washed up on the beach in front of the Gearhart Hotel. The other two were about one mile north.

Smith said he had examined the dead fish with a geiger counter to determine if last year's nuclear explosion had caused the deaths. Results of the test were negative, he said.
