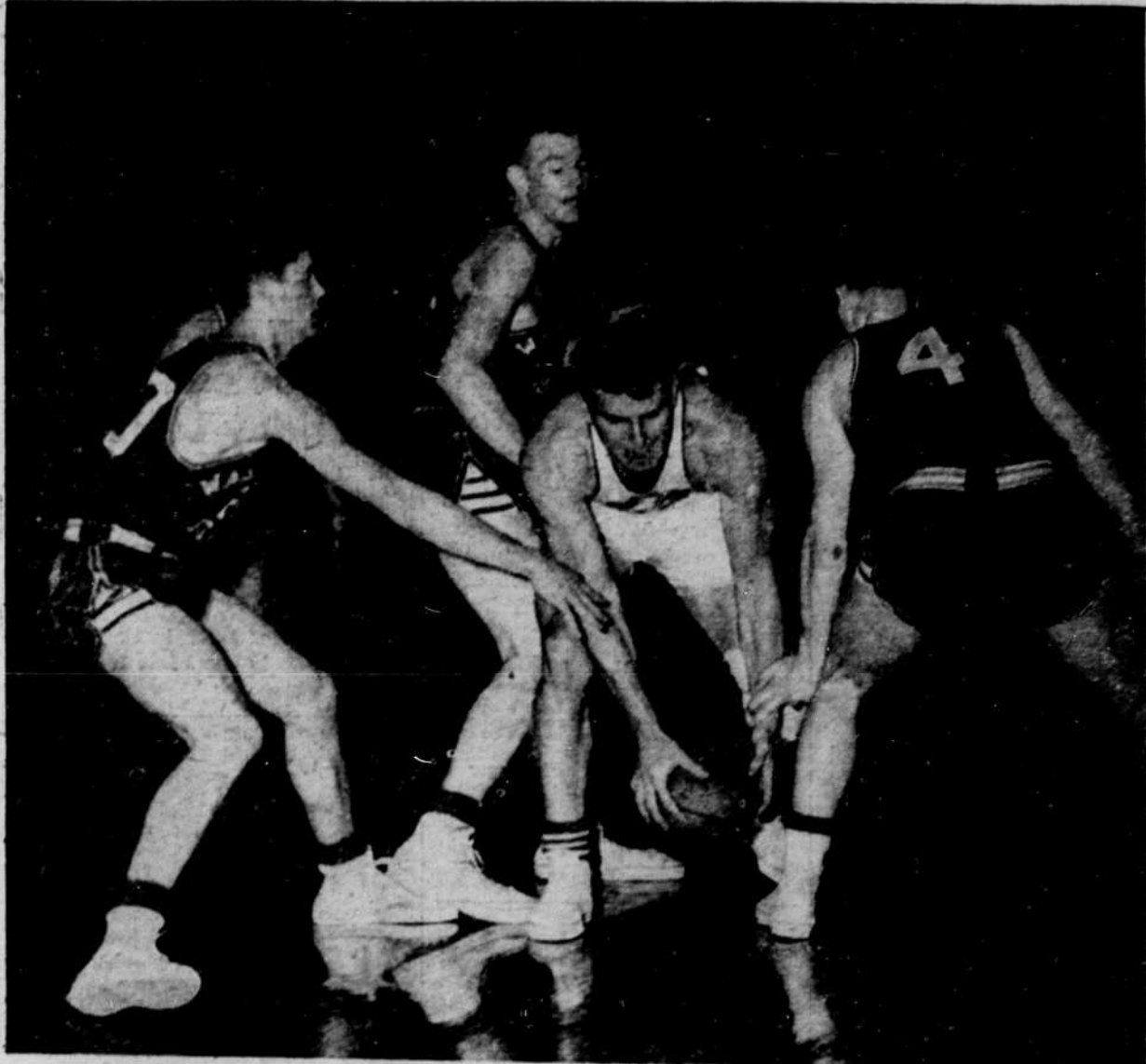

ketball team to an easy 76-63 over Washington State's out-classed but game Cougars Tuesday night to take a firmer hold on second place in the Northern Division hoop chase.

The game followed the same pattern as Monday night's en-

counter as the inspired Duck quintet took the lead on Phil McHugh's push shot after only 11 seconds and completely dominated the first half.

In the second half, both teams cleared the bench and Oregon coasted in for its third win in

a row over the luckless Cougars. The series wound up the season's conference action between the two clubs. The two losses shoved the Staters deeper into the ND cellar after four straight setbacks in their Willamette valley invasion.

Loscutoff was the whole show for the Ducks for the second night in a row as his accuracy in a variety of shots—including a couple that were nearly impossible—brought cheers from the quiet crowd of 4637. He got 26 points for the 32 minutes he played, eight more than Center Bill Rehder of the Cougars.

The grinning 227-pounder also grabbed off 21 rebounds with Center Max Anderson chipping in 13 as the Ducks dominated the boards by a big margin. Loscutoff's efforts against the Cougars gave him the conference leadership in both rebounds and points-per-game and his 12 field goals tied an all-time Oregon record for Northern Division play set by Barney Holland.

Forward Ray Bell, the most improved man on the squad since conference play began, again gave a great defensive performance as he held WSC scoring ace Ron Bennink to one field goal for the second night in a row. Bennink still managed to garner 11 out of 15 free throw tries for 13 points. Bell fouled out with 7:37 left in the contest.

Although Bennink was ineffective from the floor, Rehder gave a fine performance for the losing cause as he slipped through the Ducks' sagging man-to-man defense several times to put eight buckets on the Cougar ledger. His .533 shooting average was high for Coach Jack Friel's club, who ended up the night with a .303 average against the Ducks' hot 414.

For Oregon, Loscutoff got his dozen field goals on 25 shots from the floor for a .480 average. Guard Howard Page bounced back from mediocre showing Monday night as he dunked in five baskets in nine attempts to take second in the Webfoot bucket brigade with 10 points.

The Webfoots ran up a 7-0 lead after only 2½ minutes of play were gone. Then Bennink hit the first—and his last—basket for the losers. After a brief exchange of baskets

the Ducks had a 22-15 lead with half the period gone when WSC went into a point drouth.

For four minutes WSC went scoreless while Oregon put in 10 straight points, enabling the Duck quintet to build up a commanding 36-24 lead at the half. Cougar second-platoon Al Kamps was injured going after a rebound during the Oregon scoring flurry and did not return in the contest.

In the second half Oregon increased its lead steadily until midway through the final period when Bell's two free throws from Ron Nelson's foul gave the winners a 25-point lead at 63-38. After an exchange of baskets, WSC cut down the huge Oregon margin in the final eight minutes of the contest as the Cougar regulars played out the string against Borchers' reserves.

Washington State was visibly tired from their four-games-in-five-nights excursion against Oregon State and the Ducks but the Webfoot strength on the boards during the series was the main factor in the pair of wins. Oregon's forward wall of Loscutoff, Anderson and Bell nabbed 79 rebounds during the series to only 63 for the entire Cougar squad.
