

Ex-Frosh Star Leads Scorers

SEATTLE-(AP)-Oregon's collegians took the lead as the first Northwest collegiate scoring totals for 1955 were compiled Thursday, with Don Porter of Linfield, a former Oregon Frosh player, out in front with 317 points in 13 games.

Right behind him with 316 was Norm Hubert of Pacific and in third spot with 288 was Whitworth's Phil Jordan, who is ineligible now and will lose ground in future tabulations.

Before he left the scene, Jordan

dan compiled the best average of 28.8 points per tilt. Hubert followed with 26.3.

Vlastelica Misses

It took a total of better than 150 points to land a player in the top 20. Such scoring aces as Oregon State's Tony Vlastelica (147) and Jack Daywalt of St. Martin's (156) failed to make it.

Totals compiled by the Associated Press found Dick Edwards of Eastern Washington fourth with 243, followed by Dick Bartel of Portland university at 224 and Ted Schadewitz of Eastern Oregon college with 216.

Top man among the Northern Division's entrants was Dean Parsons of Washington, who also was the last of the group scoring more than 200. The burly Washington center had 207 at the end of last week when tabulations were made.

Duck Swimmers In AAU Meet

Coach John Borchardt's varsity swimming team will make its first splash in 1955 season competition Saturday and Sunday when the Webfoot plungers travel to Multnomah Athletic club pool in Portland for the state AAU meet.

Seven lettermen are back from last year's squad. Borchardt's new edition of the Duck team includes 13 more men, eight of whom are freshmen and will not be eligible for varsity competition.

Returning lettermen are Jerry Froebe, Phil Lewis, Harry Fuller, Yoji Matsushima, John England and Howard Hedinger.

Froebe, Lewis and Hedinger will concentrate on the 60 and 100-yard free-style sprint events, while Fuller and Matsushima are to swim the free-style distance events of 220 and 440 yards.

England and perhaps Hedinger will enter the backstroke competition. Bob Hayes and Jean Bowles are scheduled to perform in breaststroke events. A question mark shadows lack of experience in the diving department, although Walt Ching is considered quite promising.

Following this weekend's AAU meet in Portland, the Webfoots will await encounters with the Northern Division teams, including two tests with Oregon State. Another meet, as yet unscheduled, may match the Ducks against the Multnomah Athletic club team. The season will close with Oregon playing host to the Northern Division meet here on March 4 and 5.

Also mentioned were Wendy Raser for his outside shooting in the first game, Wimp Hastings for his defensive play and Forward Bob Farris for his hustle and determination. Kirsch also commented on Farris's defensive work and said he planned to use him "more extensively."

In Wednesday and Thursday workouts the Duckling coach emphasized hard defensive drills and attempted to smooth up the offensive machine. Kirsch said he was dissatisfied with the offense against a man-to-man defense.

"We looked good against a zone, but couldn't seem to solve the man-to-man they threw at us after the first 10 minutes of the second game," he said.
