## Russians Arrest Viennese Official

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Soviet authorities in Vienna Saturday arrested Dr. Alfred Sokolowski, an interpreter and liaison officer between the city and the occupying Russians since 1946.

Sokolowski was arrested when he went to the Soviet Kommandatura on city business. His arrest shocked the city and caused Lord Mayor Franz Jonas and city Police Chief Josef Holoubek to appeal to the Russians personally for his release. The Soviets refused saying he was a suspected war criminal.

An informal meeting of American, British and French officials of the Vienna Inter-Allied Command also discussed a possible protest to the Russians.
