Plane Crash Takes All Thirteen Lives

CORNER BROOK, Nfld. (AP)—A U.S. Navy Super-Constellation crashed in the foggy gulf off St. Lawrence Monday and all 13 persons aboard were feared drowned. Search ships and planes have reported no signs of life.

One Northwest man was aboard. — Airman third class Gerald L. Crafton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Crafton, 731 Elm St., Reedsport.

A rescue plane sighted three empty life rafts and an oil slick in the Cabot Straits area 29 miles off the southwest coast of Newfoundland.

A ship in the area reported finding no survivors. An air search was hampered by dense fog, but half a dozen other ships, rescue launches and tugs sped to the scene.

The plane's pilot was identified as Lt. Comdr. L. R. Fullmer Jr., of Little Rock, Ark.

British Laborite to Speak At Assembly in SU Tuesday

"The Challenge from Asia and Africa" will be discussed by Fenner Brockway at a University assembly Tuesday, January 25.

A coffee hour at 4 p.m. in the Dads' Lounge will follow the 1 p.m. lecture which will be held in the Student Union ballroom.

Fenner Brockway was born in Calcutta, India, the son and grandson of English missionaries who served in India and Africa respectively. Interested in journalism he set out to earn his living by writing.

At 23 he became assistant editor of the Labour Leader, the Inde-

pendent Labour Party weekly, and a year later became its editor.

Became Objector

When war broke out in 1914, Fenner Brockway became one of the younger leaders of a movement which formed the No-Conscription Fellowship, composed of Quakers and other religious objectors to war. Twelve thousand of these men were imprisoned. Brockway served sentences totaling more than three years.

In 1923 Fenner Brockway returned to the ILP headquarters and became editor of the New Leader, successor to the Labour Leader. In 1928 he visited India as the ILP fraternal delegate to the Indian National Congress. He became a close friend of both Gandhi and Nehru.

In 1929 Fenner Brockway was elected ILP Member of Parliament for East Leyton, a seat which he lost in the election of 1932 when the Labour Party suffered overwhelming defeat. There followed 15 years of political inactivity during which time he established the Central Board for Conscientious Objectors to assist young men who were opposed to conscription and war.

After resigning from the ILP Party in 1946 and was elected in 1945, he rejoined the Labour Labour M. P. for Eton and Slough in 1950.

Champions African Freedom

In 1948 the Congress of Peoples Against Imperialism was formed and Fenner Brockway was named as its chairman. Since then he has devoted most of his time to the cause of freedom for the colonial people of Africa.

He has been to Africa three times, visiting the Sudan, Uganda and Kenya in 1950, Tunisia in 1951 and in 1952 a return visit to Kenya with Leslie Hale, M. P., to learn the causes of the Mau Mau uprising. His booklet, "Why Mau Mau?" is a report and analysis of his findings.

Fenner Brockway is equally con-

cerned about the impoverishment, disease and illiteracy of colonial peoples. He is a passionate advocate of the idea that nations should divert their armament to a world fund to meet these needs. His booklet, "Waging Peace," is a plea for efforts in this direction.

Tax Proposal to Go To Oregon Senate

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—A 3 per cent sales tax, to raise \$60,000,000 per year for schools at the local level, was being prepared Monday for introduction into the Oregon legislature by Rep. Earl Hill, Cushman, Lane County.

The bill probably would be referred to the people, who already have voted five times against a sales tax.

While none of the money would go to the state, it would help the state budget, because it would reduce the amount of state aid that would have to be given to school districts. In the governor's budget, this aid is scheduled to amount to \$35,000,000 a year for the next two years.

Ex-president Resumes Post In Costa Rican Government

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP)—The Costa Rican rebels' secret radio announced Monday ex-President Rafael Angel Calderon Guardia of Costa Rica had assumed supreme command of the revolutionary movement.

The broadcast, heard here, said Calderon Guardia was at rebel headquarters somewhere in Costa Rica and had appointed Teodoro Picado Jr., West Point-educated son of another former Costa Rican President, field commander for the rebels.

US Planes Reach San Jose Airport

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP)—Four U. S. fighter planes roared into San Jose's new airport Monday to strengthen Costa Rica's weak air arm, and the 6-day-old war against rebels seeking to unseat President Jose Figueres ground to a halt.

"During the day no fights of any sort were reported," said a general staff communique Monday night reporting on the situation at 7 p.m. in Northwestern Costa Rica, the only previously active front.

The general staff said elsewhere in the country "complete calm" prevailed and the government was in "absolute control of the situation."

The communique said in the Northwest "advanced army patrols carried out active missions during the day but in no case established contact with the enemy, which seems to be disconcerted and the victim of unrest."

"Things are going well," Figueres said earlier Monday, adding, "I can see little choice for the rebels, but surrender or go back to Nicaragua."

Monday night's communique made no mention of an earlier report that a rebel aircraft had been over Liberia, often strafed town in the Northwest, at almost the same time the four F51D Mustangs landed from the United States.
